API Semester program in Krakow, Poland

The Department of Germanic and Slavic Languages and Literatures and the Study Abroad Office are seeking your approval for a semester program in Krakow, Poland through API (Academic Programs International), to be available to UNC-Chapel Hill students commencing fall semester 2016.

Rationale

In consultation with faculty and academic departments, the Study Abroad Office has been diligently seeking programs in Central and Eastern Europe that would be of interest to students wanting to study in that part of Europe. In the past there was a program in Poland but the program was discontinued a number of years ago due to lack of administrative and student support. However, over the past couple of years, there has been more demand for a study abroad program in Poland. While there is currently the Math in Budapest program and one to two students go each year, it is strictly for Math majors.

Due to the increased interest in study abroad programs in Central and Eastern Europe, a small working group, led by Dr. Robert Jenkins (then Director of the Center for Slavic, Eurasian and East European Studies), met in Fall 2014 and discussed a variety of programs; Lynn Neddo (Continental Europe Programs Director) presented some of the programs in Eastern Europe offered through API. Later in the spring 2015, Lynn Neddo was given the opportunity to undertake a site/program visit with API and she visited the programs in Krakow, Poland, Budapest, Hungary and Dubrovnik, Croatia. This proposal is for the program in Poland; another proposal will be presented for the program in Croatia. The program in Budapest is strongly oriented for Business students and did not seem to fit the needs of the students in Arts and Sciences.

Description

The program in Krakow is a small program (generally around 15-20 students) and has an on-site Director. Krakow is located in Southern Poland, is a former capital, and is the home of the Jagiellonian University, Poland's oldest university. The town is also recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage Site and, unlike most Polish cities, Krakow's structures survived WWII virtually undamaged. Krakow also has a Jewish quarter and a very rich historical heritage. It is a mid-sized city, and thanks to the 150,000 students, it is vibrant but also very welcoming. It is easily navigable by foot, bicycle or the tram. Students will quickly feel at home in Krakow. The program is very reasonable price-wise and the cost of living in Krakow is also very reasonable.

Courses and Faculty

Students take classes taught in English with visiting students in Jagiellonian's Interdisciplinary Program in Humanities and Social Sciences but can also take up to two classes per semester with Polish students that are taught in English in American studies, business and communications, European studies, psychology, sociology and more. All students take a Polish language course and other courses in civilization and culture are also available.

The faculty are from the Jagiellonian University. During the site visit in March, Lynn had the opportunity to meet with some of the faculty and their mastery of the English language was excellent.

Sample faculty CVs and course syllabi are attached in appendices.

Academic Requirements and Credit

UNC-Chapel Hill students participating in this program will need to have a 2.75 GPA to be eligible, and be in good academic standing. Students will take a full load of studies and be able to transfer back between 12 and 18 credits.

Although there is no need for prior Polish language study, students will be required to take a language course as this will help them navigate and get to know the local culture during their stay in Krakow.

TREQ credit will be awarded as long as the student receives a C or better in each course taken. API will send an official transcript of all completed courses to the UNC-CH Study Abroad Office.

Students will also have volunteer opportunities and the possibility of non-credit bearing internships.

Logistics, Health and Safety

Facilities

All courses are taught at the Jagiellonian University, which has buildings throughout the center part of the city. All classrooms are equipped with modern technology.

Housing

Students live in carefully chosen apartments throughout Krakow. The Resident Director is available at all times to help students adjust to life in Krakow and Poland and give them information about food,

shopping, eating out, transportation, and other everyday necessities. Students are met upon arrival at the airport.

Other activities

After the students arrive, before classes actually begin, several days are devoted to an orientation program, during which the students learn, among other things, to organize their lives in the new environment.

There are a number of events, activities and excursions planned throughout the semester. Please see the website for a listing of the different excursions planned during each semester.

Health and Safety

Currently the State Department website states that the threat of terrorism in Poland is low. Although political demonstrations are a regular occurrence of the Polish political scene, they are, for the most part, orderly and peaceful and mostly happen in Warsaw. Poland generally has a low rate of violent crime, while the incidence of street crime, which sometimes involves violence, is moderate.

Students will have a pre-departure orientation before they leave for their program and then will have a more in depth orientation led by the Resident Director once they are on site. Students are covered by health insurance through the API provider and it is on par with the HTH insurance coverage required by UNC.

Conclusion

We hope this proposal has given a clear representation of the API in Krakow (Poland) semester program. We believe this program will be attractive to students who have already taken some Polish but also those interested in studying in a Central and Eastern European country for various reasons. We are happy to provide you with any additional information you might need to aid in your evaluations of this proposal.

Jakub Basista, Ph.D., D.Litt.

Associate Professor of history at the Institute of History, Jagiellonian University. His interests concentrate on early modern and modern period. In particular he has undertaken extensive research on seventeenth century English history, colonial issues in the early modern period, Central European/Polish twentieth century, and history of Jews in Poland.

In the years 1992-2002 he was the country director for Poland (and 200-2002 the Baltic countries) of Civic Education Project. The subsequent 10 years (2003-2013) he was teaching English and American history and culture at a private college in Warsaw.

He served one term as a vice-director of the Institute of History, Jagiellonian University responsible for didactics.

His works include two boos on seventeenth century England in Polish, two books co-edited in English and about 80 articles, reviews, commentaries in Polish and foreign periodical, encyclopedias and books. Since 2012 he is head editor of Polish historical quarterly *Studia Historyczne*.

Since 1997 he has lectured in English for foreign students (US and Erasmus). The prepared and taught courses include (but are not limited to):

The instructor must approve the person, whose biography will be written.

Ad 3. A take-home exam of 3 answers out of 12 questions will be written in January. Each essay will be about 1500 words and of academic quality.

Holocaust and its cultural meaning (45 contact hours = 3 credit points)

Prerequisites: Intermediate or higher level of English fluency

There is no question that the Holocaust is the definitive event of the twentieth century for the West. Yet only after over half a century do we find that all the world can finally and freely speak of the Holocaust and the effect it has had on European and Western culture. The Shoah needs to be understood as something more than a historical or political event.

The introductory classes will build a foundation based on analysis of the changing terminology and definitions, as well as situate the Holocaust against the historical backdrop and social context of modern Europe. Presented and analyzed next will be the fundamental questions provoked by the Holocaust (e.g., how did it happen, what did political leaders do or not do, how did ordinary people react,, etc.). The perpetrator, victim, and bystander roles will be discussed in detail; means of resistance and rescue will also be examined. As the course is being taught in Central Europe, attention will be paid to pre- and postcommunist memory of the Holocaust.

Each meeting will center on a specific theme and questions. The primary aim is to enable the student to examine the many facets of Holocaust history and memory. Another goal is to arrive at a more critical, analytical, and nuanced understanding of the Shoah. Students will be able to demythologize the Holocaust and critique the presentations and representations (or lack thereof), in private and public discourse, in their own and other nation-states, under totalitarian and democratic systems.
