Proposed Revisions to the Major and Minor in Religious Studies, the Minor in Christianity and Culture, and the Minor in Middle Eastern and Islamic Studies

Dear Colleagues,

I am writing to propose revisions to the undergraduate major and minor in **Religious Studies.** The reasons for this request is to a) include Hinduism as one of the religious traditions that we teach, due to a recent hire, b) update the affiliation of an Adjunct Assistant Professor, c) note 3 existing courses as having an honors version and one as cross-listed, and d) recognize many (31) courses that are new in the Undergraduate Bulletin. An edited version of the Undergraduate Bulletin section describing the Major and an edited version of the Undergraduate Bulletin section describing our courses are attached – please note that all the changes to the Major also need to be applied to the Minor in Religious Studies.

I am also writing to propose revisions to two minors housed in our department. For the **Minor in Christianity and Culture**, there are many (7) courses new to the Undergraduate Bulletin. An edited version of the Undergraduate Bulletin section describing the C&C minor is attached. For the **Minor in Islamic and Middle Eastern Studies**, the reasons for this revision are to a) include many (10) courses that are new in the Undergraduate Bulletin, and b) delete a course. An edited version of the Undergraduate Bulletin section describing the IMES minor is attached.

Correction: including 12 courses, not 10.
