Dear Dean Thompson and Members of the Administrative Boards,
I am writing with a proposed change to the undergraduate Minor track in Greek in the Department of Classics. The Minor track in Greek offers an opportunity for students majoring in other subjects to take a sequence of courses in Greek language and literature, from beginning to advanced. We offer this option particularly for students majoring in Religious Studies, Comparative Literature, English, Linguistics, History, and other fields who want to establish and document proficiency in classical Greek as part of their larger research goals. In this sense, the Minor in Greek is a cross-disciplinary track for students who have some interest in Greek, but who do not plan to major (nor, indeed, to pursue graduate study) in Classics. To encourage such students to begin Greek and to continue studying the language, we would like to make the Greek Minor more compatible with our current pattern of course offerings and fully accessible to students who begin Greek in their second year at UNC.

The Minor in Greek currently requires students to complete nine hours in advanced Greek (GREK 221 or higher). With our current offering of only one advanced Greek course per semester, students who begin Greek in their second year need to take at least one course at another institution to complete the Minor. We therefore propose changing the requirement for advanced Greek from nine hours to six hours, and adding a requirement for three hours of coursework in classical civilization, archaeology, language, and/or literature in translation. The revised Minor requirements would thus still ensure that students complete at least six semesters of classical Greek language courses as well as acquire a broader background in classical GraecoRoman culture.

This proposal was discussed and unanimously endorsed by the Department faculty in our meeting on Wednesday 27 September.

I am attaching a Word document with the mark-up showing the requested changes. Thank you for your consideration, and please let me know if you need any additional information.

## Department of Classics

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Classics is the study of the ancient Greek and Roman world; the Greek and Latin languages and literature; and the history, art, and culture that have been fundamental in shaping modern society. The Greek minor is a less intensive version of the Greek concentration in the major, and requires only three courses in Greek beyond the fourth semester. It is a useful option for students with a particular interest in ancient philosophy or early Christianity.
