Subject: Revision to the Hispanic Studies Minor, Department of Romance Studies

#### **CHANGE TO THE HISPANIC STUDIES MINOR:**

Proposed by the Spanish Section of the Department of Romance Studies, October 2017:

**Summary**: The Spanish section requests to replace the current prerequisite of SPAN 250, 255 or 260 with the newly proposed course, SPAN 261 (or 267 for Heritage learners) Advanced Spanish in Context. We also wish to remove the allied course requirement, replacing it with a Spanish course numbered above 330, excluding SPAN 401, 402, 404, 405, and 601.

**Justification**: A prerequisite course that reviews grammar and writing in authentic contexts will serve as a logical bridge between SPAN 204 and upper-level courses in culture, literature and linguistics. We wish to remove the allied course requirement that we established years ago when we were unable to meet the demand of students wishing to enroll in upper-level Spanish courses. As the Spanish Minor for the Professions has grown, more space has opened up in our upper-level courses to once again accommodate students. We feel that students will have the opportunity to gain greater proficiency and more concentrated knowledge of the Hispanic world by taking a fourth course taught in Spanish in the department.

#### CHANGE TO THE SPANISH MINOR FOR THE PROFESSIONS:

Proposed by the Spanish Section of the Department of Romance Studies, October 2017:

**Summary**: The Spanish section has three requests for changes to the SPPM:

- 1. Change the current prerequisite, SPAN 204, to the newly proposed course SPAN 261 (or 267 for Heritage learners) Advanced Spanish in Context.
- 2. Inactivate SPAN 265, the current first course in the minor, replacing it with one of the 3 proposed second-level profession-specific courses: SPAN 325 (business track), SPAN 328 (medical track), and SPAN 324 (law track).
- 3. Remove the allied course requirement, replacing it with a Spanish course numbered above 330, excluding SPAN 401, 402, 404, 405, and 601.

**Justification**: A 5<sup>th</sup>-semester prerequisite course that reviews grammar and writing in authentic contexts will serve as a logical bridge to the minor, better preparing students for the courses in the minor. We believe students will be better served by replacing the general SPAN 265 with a second-level course in their profession-specific track. We wish to remove the allied course requirement that we established years ago when we were unable to meet the demand of students wishing to enroll in upper-level Spanish courses. We can once again accommodate students in those courses and feel that students will have the opportunity to gain greater proficiency and more concentrated knowledge of the Hispanic world by taking a fourth course taught in Spanish in the department.

Note: We have inactivated SPAN 322 Spanish for Journalism and Mass Communications and SPAN 327 Venture Creation in the Spanish-Speaking World due to lack of demand.

#### Spanish Minor for the Professions

The capstone course in the minor includes experiential learning through field work and/or public service.

**Justification**: A prerequisite course that reviews grammar and writing in authentic contexts will serve as a logical bridge from SPAN 204 to SPAN 300, providing better articulation in the Hispanic linguistics curriculum.

The over 50 million Hispanics in the United States have become the fastest-growing social and political segment in North America. Because of its prominence, learning to communicate in Spanish can be essential for those entering the global economic market and numerous professions.

Spanish studies at UNC—Chapel Hill thrives on innovative literary, linguistic, and theoretical approaches to the Spanish-speaking world, and includes the study of indigenous, Afro-descendant, Asian, and other cultures. Students will acquire competence in the practice and analysis of Romance languages together with a critical knowledge of the written, oral, and visual traditions of their origin and diaspora. ## Requirements

- take at least half of their major course requirements (courses and credit hours) at UNC-Chapel Hill
- earn a minimum of 18 hours of C or better in the major core requirements (some majors require 21 hours).

# **Special Opportunities in Romance Studies Honors**

The departmental honors program is open to any qualified major with a cumulative grade point average of 3.3 or higher and 3.5 or higher in their major courses. Eligible honors candidates will formulate a topic and select an appropriate faculty member to supervise the writing of an honors thesis. Specific coursework for the major with honors consists of enrollment in the honors thesis courses in the language of the major emphasis.

691H is taken in the fall semester of the senior year and 692H is taken in the spring semester. FREN, ITAL, PORT, SPAN 398 Undergraduate Seminar may be substituted for the research course if the subject of the seminar is central to the research project chosen. In the 692H course the thesis will be completed and the student examined by the supervisor and two additional faculty members, to be agreed upon by the student and supervisor. The director of honors, in consultation with the examiners, will recommend that the student who has defended the thesis graduate with honors, highest honors, or with course credit. Courses numbered 691H or 398 may count toward the eight courses for the major, but 692H may not. Students who intend to graduate in December should adjust the scheduling of these courses in order to allow for completion of the honors project in December. Students meeting the required grade point averages should contact the undergraduate advisor for their language. #### CHANGE TO THE HISPANIC LITERATURES AND CULTURES MAJOR:

Proposed by the Spanish Section of the Department of Romance Studies, October 2017:

**Summary**: The Spanish section requests to inactivate SPAN 260, the current prerequisite for the major, to the newly-proposed SPAN 261 Advanced Spanish in Context (SPAN 267 for Heritage learners). We have also proposed SPAN 301 Introduction to Literary and Cultural Analysis (302 for Heritage Learners) as the first course in the major, replacing SPAN 300 or 326.

**Justification**: A prerequisite course that reviews grammar and writing in authentic contexts will better serve students as they prepare for upper-level courses in Spanish. SPAN 301 or 302 as a sixth-semester first course in the major will provide a more solid foundation for students in Hispanic Literatures and Cultures.
