### Requirements for all substitution courses:

The course is regularly taught.

## Criteria for qualification as a foreign language substitution course.

- 1. The course must be taught in English.
- 2. The course content must focus on one of the following content areas:
  - a. Literatures and/or cultures of a country, countries, or region of a country that is not predominantly English speaking (Example: GERM 216 The Viking Age).
  - b. Literature and/or culture of ethnic groups in the U.S. (Example: AMST 246 Indigenous Storytelling: Oral, Written, and Visual Literatures of Native America).
  - c. Language exploration, development and/or analysis (Example: LING 101 Introduction to Language).

#### Criteria for qualification as a QR / QI substitution course.

Courses should have two or more of the following components:

- Translation of information into symbols. For example, representation of note pitch and length in music notation or representation of phonemes using the International Phonetic Alphabet (Example: PHIL 157 Logic and Decision Theory, MUSC 121 Fundamentals of Music I)
- Representation of information in structured visual form such as charts, tables, and graphs, in which visual elements convey relationships in a consistent manner. For example, pedigree charts in genetics, or topographical maps in geography. (Example: GEOG 370 Introduction to Geographic Information)
- 3. Use of logic to construct and evaluate arguments. For example, classification of logically equivalent and non-equivalent statements, or recognition and labeling of fallacies like double counting or false dichotomy. (Example: PHIL 157 Logic and Decision Theory)
- 4. Summary, analysis, estimation, or interpretation of numerical data. For example, use of a scatterplot to identify trends and outliers, or computing or estimating rates of change from graphs. (Example: MASC 310 Our Changing Planet: Science, Social Impacts, Solutions)
- 5. Creation or use of algorithms. For example, flow charts for determining health care treatment plans. (Example: INLS 151 [INLS 200] Retrieving and Analyzing Information)

Remember that courses on the substitution list do not qualify as QR or QI courses. So the courses should NOT:

- use mathematical tools beyond the level of basic algebra and statistics
- 2. involve formal proofs
- 3. require computer programming
- 4. spend more than half of class time on mathematical modeling, mathematical analysis, or data analysis
- 5. carry the QI or QR designation
- 6. have a prerequisite that carries the QI or QR designation
